

First Steps into Global Change

João's very first professional role was as an intern at the Global Alliance for a Sustainable Planet (GASP). In that moment, he stepped directly into the intricate world of climate finance, systems thinking, and multilateral diplomacy. Rather than merely observing the global sustainability discourse, he helped shape the conversation itself. That experience infused him with a dual sense of urgency and humility a rare combination that has become a strategic asset over time. It didn't just launch his career it laid the foundation for a leadership style rooted in deep engagement, strategic partnership, and a firm belief in the power of collective voice.

Don't Anchor yourself

Raised in Portugal in a home where education, ethics, and resilience were deeply valued, João developed a notion of leadership defined by service, not position. Regular dinner table debates on justice, a shared concern for the future climate, and community responsibility nurtured his notion that impact on the world was the only acceptable ambition. Crucially, mentors in his life didn't just open doors, they showed him how to build entirely new ones. This mindset continues to guide his work, fuelling an entrepreneurship not anchored in legacy building, but rather in creativity and intentional outlook for the future.





Lessons in Leadership

At a decisively formative stage, he recognised an uncomfortable truth: the climate crisis's pace was outstripping the development of regulatory responses. That tension pushed him toward the intersection of law, ESG, and innovation. From that point onwards, mission clarity became his North Star. Anything that didn't measurably support systemic sustainability wasn't worth pursuing. In those early, scrappy days of building his initiative, credibility emerged as his most valuable asset and he learned that consistency, especially when unseen, laid the foundation before the spotlight ever arrived. Equally important was the practice of strategic patience: discerning when to accelerate efforts and when to nurture slowlygrowing alliances. Perhaps most impactful were mentors, not only as sources of counsel, but as pillars of accountability that kept him aligned with his core mission.

Co-Authoring the Future

Reflecting on his journey, João acknowledges he would've embraced experimentation sooner. Recognising that in policy and ESG work, the pursuit of perfection can be a hidden deterrent to speed and adaptability, he discovered the power of saying "no", safeguarding his time to preserve his impact. Asking for help earlier and more often is also something João says should never be perceived as a sign of weakness, but rather an act of leadership. Today, his message to emerging innovators is concise and potent: "the future is not inherited it is co-authored." Every day offers a new page in the narrative of sustainable leadership one we write together with intention, courage, and humility.
